Thank you for being the drivers of change, and thank you for honouring us with the responsibility of making your vision for a better world a reality.

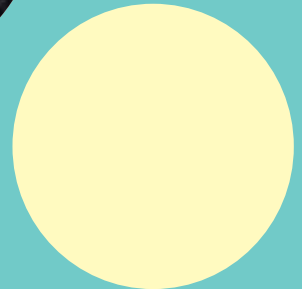

Aid is the beginning, but it does not build a future. In 2011, thanks to your support, families in Haiti who were made homeless by the earthquake were given a new home, and the chance for a real future. Children in three communities were given the chance to go to school through our school-building program in Jamaica, giving them, and their communities a better future. 3000 children in Haiti were ready to start the school year with a backpack filled with pens, pencils, books and crayons.

For the 50th anniversary of Jamaica's independence, the **50@50 Project** was developed to advance **Early Childhood Education** by building schools and training teachers across the island.

This is an ambitious, visionary project that will transform Jamaica's education system. The first school will open in September of 2012 with one school a month opening for 50 months.

40% of all Jamaicans fail their exams at grade 4, so this one of the most important projects that **Food For The Poor** has worked on in its 30 years serving in the Caribbean and Latin America. We ask you to be a part of the legacy, a better education will change everything.

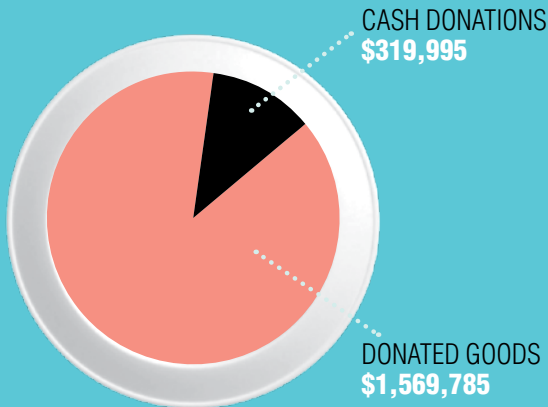

In 2011, the Canadian community of support for Haiti and Jamaica has grown ever wider. We are proud to serve all our partners :

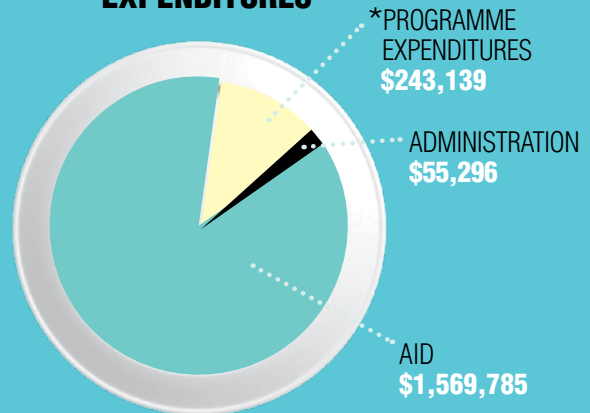

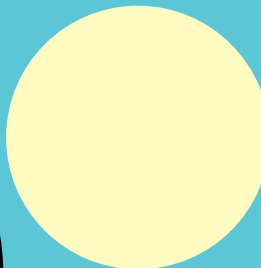
EXPENDITURES
